### In-Reach to Prisons

- Institutional Services (group and individual)
- Native Inmate Liaison Officers
- Substance Use and Housing Services
- Discharge planning (when possible)
- Volunteers/ Mailbag program
- Freeing the Human Spirit

# Why do we need Reintegration Centre?

### **Toronto South Detention Centre:**

- 160 Horner Ave. -Opened January 27, 2014
- \$594 million to build
- Capacity for 1,620 male inmates-replace older local jails (closed or decommissioned) deal with future capacity needs (adult provincial correctional system)
- First jail in Ontario to use pre-fabricated modular cells.
- Built in Atlanta, Georgia -shipped by rail carequipped with its own plumbing, windows, doors, and wiring.
- Limited visitation (CCTV, few interview rooms)

- Those sentenced to 90 days or more LSI OR assessment and moved elsewhere- currently after 11 days
- 210 new admissions a week
- 180 releases a week (this does not include returns from court who are discharged from the site later that day or from onsite at bail).
- Average age -34 yrs old, 20% will be older than 21 yrs old
- Predicted average stay for remanded inmates at TSDC is 30 days
- Built to maximum security specifications but can house all level of inmates.

# Main Objectives

- Afford better access by releasees to services and programs as indicated by need
- Respond to immediate needs
- Reduce high-risk behaviours and/or accidental drug overdoses causing death
- Improve the flow between services (inside/outside)
- Provide hope, positive role models, and support (PWLE)
- Increase community safety
- Decrease recidivism

#### Soft Opening - Reintegration Centre

- Six partner organizations
- Space: Two floors
- Personnel:
  - RC Coordinator
  - Housing worker (PIHS)
  - Intake/Reception
  - 3 P/T Peers
  - Staff representative/s from each organization
- TJSC Release have begun walking through the door
- Currently developing a collective service delivery and referral process

### About RC space

- Conduct short needs assessment to provide appropriate "Warm" referrals (internal/external) in private intake rooms
- Provide HR education and support Provide community accompaniment for releasees to referral points (peers)
- Establish phone/computer equipped resource area for releasees to use while waiting to meet with a Centre Intake Worker.
- Afford separate waiting/resource area for family members and loved ones
- Transportation assistance
- Clothing, food etc.

#### The Evaluation Committee

- To build on success and re-adjust practices as needed (No other projects like this have been found in the existing body of literature and certainly not within a Canadian context)
- Array of participants- mostly academics, hope to include PWLE
- Established role and goals
- Publications and reports
- Dissemination including media
- Leverage for sustainable funding
- Transferable to other contexts
- Literature review, REB approval, data collection (intake forms), analysis etc..
- U of T School of Health application
