

INTERSECTIONALITY – KIMBERLE CRENSHAW

Intersectionality is the acknowledgement that everyone has their own unique experiences of discrimination and oppression and we must consider everything and anything that can marginalize people – gender, race, class, sexual orientation, physical ability

 - seek and act on input and feedback
 - learn from mistakes and successes
 - what does successful reintegration look like



TAKE AWAYS

Courts: What does innocent until proven guilty looks like?

Often times the onus is on the accused defense lawyers to work the hardest in court to prove innocence, when it should be the other way around.

Police: What does serve & protect look like? Serve and protect who? When at the onset of engagements rights are being infringed upon and trust and relationships are being broken.

CSC: What does successful reintegration look like? Opportunities to TR maybe supervised and unsupervised How will you know when it comes time for parole that the offender should be considered.

Harm Reduction: What does harm reduction look like to you? Maybe it's access to, education, employment, health care and sustainable housing, financial and basic needs.

Community Support: What does community support look like to you? Maybe it's building trusting relationships and providing access to, resource and services from a trauma informed and an intersectional lens.
