minutes minutes: Sara followed up with information shared by Kyla Storry on the numbers of calls received by police which was the following: In 2014 there was 55 calls from police (this includes Treaty 3, OPP, Dryden Police Service and NAPS). Kyla did indicate that this is not a true picture of how many calls are from police as they do not collect information on secondary service involvement or referral sources. It is anticipated that over 50% of referrals for individuals that come to the Dryden Regional Mental Health Center are brought in by police. In 2014 the Kenora Rainy River District Crisis Response Services received 559 referrals from the hospitals in the Kenora Rainy River District. The police, hospitals and the crisis program collaborated on at least 300 of those calls Based on this information the committee would like more information from the **BOB:** to provide the OPP in Kenora on mental health contacts and will request that Constable Bob committee with data Bernie provide this to the committee. from the OPP This was tabled again as Bob attended the meeting later Some committee members indicated that they were having some difficulties in accessing the services of the Kenora Rainy River District Crisis Response Services. There was discussion about the mental health bed in Kenora being located at the Detox Center as individuals wanting to access this bed indicate that they do not want to due to its location. There was discussion on if this bed could be a possible "virtual bed". It was indicated that members of the committee have had success in accessing the mental health bed as well as services through the Kenora Rainy River District Crisis Response Services when they: 1. Speak about having a mental health issue 2. That they do not indicate that they are calling about being homeless

As the current bed is currently placed at the Morningstar Detox Center as this is an economically feasible location the strategies identified by all parties was to engage in awareness activities for organizations and staff around the Morningstar Detox Center to assist in reducing the stigma related to individuals perceptions around the facility. Crisis bed admission for Kenora and Fort Frances was provided to the committee and reviewed there are some questions that the committee would like some clarification on which are the following:

Exclusionary criteria:

Having a primary diagnosis of organic brain syndrome: Does this include FASD?

Have severe physical health problems: Need some more information around this item.

Have convictions of assault (excluding spousal assault, charges that occurred more 10 years ago or more, and/or alcohol-related convictions): If there is a risk assessment or risk management completed will these convictions be considered?

	Are currently under the influence of drugs or alcohol (not applicable to Kenora admissions): Does being admitted to the Detox for 72 hours prior and then transferred to the mental health bed address this criteria? Does the exclusionary criteria apply to all individuals or is this criteria flexible and examined for each case. The committee has also requested to know number of individuals that have been accepted since April 1 st , 2015 for both the Kenora & Fort Frances bed and number of individuals who have not been accepted based on the exclusionary criteria. As well is there a pattern of usage at all for both beds.

	Key Sections of the Act:	
	The application of the Police Record Checks Reform Act The Act permits anyone to request a police record check be conducted on themselves A third party can request that a police record check is conducted on an individual, but that individual must provide written consent for the check to be completed (i.e. employer or volunteer organization). ***Employer requires explicit written consent*** The Act specifies who can conduct a Police Record Check and types of police record	

checks

Section 12 ensures that the police record check will only be disclosed to the individual who is the subject of the request. Written consent is required for the information to be disclosed to another person or organization. ***Person directed service*** The Act outlines the type of information that can be disclosed through the Schedule to the Act table (which is in the powerpoint presentation). The type of information permitted to be disclosed depends on the type of police record check requested. Criteria for disclosing non-conviction information is defined under Section 10 The procedure for reconsideration requests is also provided in section 10 The Act requires every police record check provider to create a process to respond to requests to correct information

The Act requires police record check providers to keep track of statistical information regarding police record check requests.

Mental Health police record information (including Mental Health Act apprehensions, orders, and police contact) will not appear on any type of police record check as per the Schedule of the Act. This includes stay of proceedings received from individuals who receive mental health diversions.

It was also indicated that when individuals cross the border with the U.S.A. that the Act is to be followed. Within the document: On the Record: An Information Guide for People Impacted by Non-Conviction Police Records in Ontario, p.29 speaks to Travelling Across the U.S. Border for further information.

It was indicated by Sharon Scharfe that there has been some inquiries of some individuals who have had their names published within the media on websites that have received mental health diversions etc. and they are not able to remove their names from the media publication. Uppala has indicated that she will be able to follow-up with this and Sharon will provide this information to Uppala.

Sara also indicated that how does the non-disclosure of mental health apprehensions affect assessments being completed by the forensic mental health system as this information is important when completing the assessments. Uppala indicated that she would follow-up with this inquiry and provide a response.

This document was disseminated to all committee members for review. Constable Bob Bernie indicated that the OPP do not disclose anything related to mental health apprehensions as they follow the guidelines. Constable Bob Bernie indicated that the Vulnerable Sector Check has to be approved by the commander and there is a risk assessment procedure that is followed once this is requested.

	Some highlights from the presentation:	
	This is now a contract with the Kenora Association for Community Living and Firefly. The program is for individuals 18 years of age and older. Individuals residing with their parents etc. are not part of the program. Individuals who are transitioning out of their parents' home to reside on their own are eligible for the program. The supports are made to meet the individual's needs. The program can assist with attending the planning table for youth who will be transitioning into the adult system with Developmental Services Ontario. The program assists the family as well with planning for the individual. Program can assist with referring individuals to the Public Guardian and Trustee however the worker is not to be a second signer with any finances. A case manager role can be taken depending on the individual. If the individual has a case manager this role will not be duplicated and the APSW worker will not be the primary worker. The case management role for the APSW can be with assisting individuals with coordination of the system, providing one to one support if required etc. This role will depend on what the individual's needs are and if there is a case manager involved. The program is a voluntary service and if the client denies wanting the service the file can be put on hold for 6 months. The program assists communities with building capacity within and will support the community as needed. The individual can be re-referred if they leave the area and return. The program is flexible and is person-centered to support the individuals to be	

	successful in the community. The program will support the different levels of what the individual requires. The service will look a bit different in each community where there is an APSW worker as each community will have different levels of other community based services in place. A brochure will be developed for assistance with clarification and identification of the items above.	DEBBIE: to send brochure to disseminate to committee once completed.

Forensic Training Working Group	 i. 2015-16 Annual Youth Justice Intensive Rehabilitative Custody and Supervision (IRCS) Regional Forum – October 29th, 2015 Training is being held at the Best Western on October 29th, 2015. Chad indicated that the Kenora area has the highest rate of kids that utilize the IRCS Program. This program is for more violent youth offenders as this is a sentencing option under the YCJA. This designation is through the courts and has a lot of funding attached to the youth for rehabilitation plans. It was indicated that approximately \$100,000 can be used for each individual youth with an IRCS sentence. The youth also will still have access to funding if they are transferred to the adult system as long as they are still under an IRCS designation. h. Situation Table

It was indicated that the training for the situation table was conducted on September 21st, 2015 with community agencies. The Steering Committee Chair will be Sara Dias & Bob Bernie. The facilitators for the situation table will be Chad English & Ashley Hendy.

Bob indicated that the purpose of the Situation Table is to provide a risk mitigation strategy on cases that pose an acutely elevated risk. There is no specific criteria to date and is open to anyone to make a referral. The steering committee will be meeting to discuss process and referral issues etc. and will disseminate once completed.

 Province to create a mental health bed registry It was announced in February 2015 that the provincial government will be creating a province-wide registry of mental health beds as part of a \$28 million investment in mental health and addiction services. The new registry will connect those experiencing a mental health crisis with the closes available bed. The province expects that the new registry will result in shorter wait times for care by providing doctors, first responders and emergency departments with up-to-date information about available inpatient beds across the province. It will also improve transitions between care teams so people do not have to tell their story multiple times to different health practitioners.

 Forensic Services for Children & Youth in Ontario Nancy provided an update in regards to this new youth forensic services. These services are for youth who require fitness to stand trial and criminal responsibility assessments that are court ordered. The purpose of the service is to allow for the least restrictive way for youth to access this service without having to be admitted to a facility for the assessment. Nancy is the regional lead for these assessments in Kenora. She will attend in youth mental health court for any issues that may arise to access the service. The goal is to see the youth in person, OTN will only be used as a last resort.
