There are 12 of 14 voting regions represented.</p> <p>Co-Chair Katie welcomed new Champlain Regional Co-Chair, Jean-Laurent Domingue, Director Patient Care Services, Integrated Forensic Program, The Royal (Ottawa).</p>

<b>3) New HSJCC Secretariat Position: Junior Policy Analyst</b>	<p>Shawn Chirrey, Interim Director, CMHA Ontario shared information about the new Junior Policy Analyst position within the HSJCC Secretariat:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• The Junior Policy Analyst position will be a full time, one year contract within the HSJCC Secretariat to support the P-HSJCC and HSJCC network.</li> <li>• The position will be funded through the budget of CMHA Ontario.</li> <li>• The position is scheduled to be posted on <b>Friday May 21<sup>st</sup>, 2021.</b></li> <li>• The Secretariat will share the job posting with the P-HSJCC and circulate via the mailing list.</li> <li>• Co-Chair Katie noted that the hope would be for the P-HSJCC Secretariat to secure enhanced funding from the provincial government to extend the Junior Policy Analyst position beyond the one-year contract if such continued support was required.</li> </ul>
<b>4) Proposed Amendments to the Terms of Reference</b>	<p>The Secretariat led a discussion on potential amendments to the background section of the P-HSJCC Terms of Reference with a focus on which categories should be included for consideration of priority populations:</p>

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• The Secretariat provided feedback from the last P-HSJCC Executive Committee meeting which included a discussion surrounding the absence of categories such as Autism Spectrum and Neurocognitive disorders in the background section of the P-HSJCC Terms of Reference.</li> <li>• The Secretariat noted they would like to ensure that the terminology for priority populations in the P-HSJCC Terms of Reference is aligned with what is currently being used within those sectors and by our ministry partners.</li> <li>• P-HSJCC members recommended that the current Terms of Reference categories be replaced with wording that represents a broader definition such as “Complex Human Services Needs” rather than naming specific conditions.</li> </ul> <p><b>ACTION:</b> The Secretariat to summarize feedback from the Terms of Reference discussion and propose some language for consideration at the next P-HSJCC Executive Meeting.</p>
<p><b>5) Provincial HSJCC Honoraria Policy</b></p>	<p>The Secretariat presented the Provincial HSJCC Honoraria Policy for feedback and approval:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• The Secretariat provided background on how the P-HSJCC is looking at improving engagement with Persons with Lived Experience across the entire network as part of their commitment identified in the P-HSJCC workplan priorities.</li> <li>• The Secretariat consulted with the P-HSJCC Persons with Lived Experience Advisory Committee and P-HSJCC Executive Committee for feedback on the Honoraria policy prior to presenting to members at the P-HSJCC meeting.</li> <li>• The P-HSJCC approved the newly developed P-HSJCC Honoraria Policy which provides an overview of the purpose, definitions, eligibility, and payment rates for engaging persons with lived experience at the Provincial level. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>➤ Although the policy was specifically developed for the Provincial HSJCC, it will serve as a helpful template for Regional and Local HSJCCs as they aim to improve the engagement of persons with lived experience in their committee’s work.</li> </ul> </li> </ul> <p><b>MOTION:</b> Joan N motioned to approve the P-HSJCC Honoraria Policy, Mary M seconded.</p>
<p><b>6) Consultation with MCCSS Youth Justice Services Division re: Closure</b></p>	<p>Co-Chair Katie introduced and thanked Assistant Deputy Minister, David Mitchell, Ministry of Children, Community and Social Services -Youth Justice Services Division, for taking the time to join the P-HSJCC Bi-Monthly meeting to continue discussions around the closure of youth justice detention centres:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• ADM Mitchell addressed members concerns related to the closure of youth justice centres including:</li> </ul>

<p><b>of Youth Justice Centres</b></p>	<p><b>Closures based on bed optimization:</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>➤ Not enough young people to occupy the beds that are available (a good problem to have).</li> <li>➤ Investing in programs that are diverting young people up stream and preventing them from entering the criminal justice system.</li> <li>➤ Have reduced the number of beds (400) in the province for external and custody.</li> <li>➤ Continue to maintain 50 percent to sub 50 percent occupancy.</li> <li>➤ Auditor General and other reports recommended that the system needed to be resized to fit the current demand.</li> </ul> <p><b>Three things that are considered for the process of the closure of Youth Justice Centers include:</b></p> <p><b>1. Security</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>➤ Young people are not advised of when they are going to moved</li> <li>➤ Probation Officers are informed as the point of contact as it relates to single case management.</li> <li>➤ Probation Officers are responsible for contacting the parents and families to where and when the young people have been moved to.</li> <li>➤ Messages were left when there was no contact with parents and family members.</li> <li>➤ Total of 7 young people in total were moved in the Northern Ontario youth justice centres.</li> <li>➤ None of the young people reported issues of being relocated due to facility closures.</li> <li>➤ ADM Mitchell met with twice with the Council of Ontario Indigenous Elders which resulted in the facilitation of a Circle w so that they Elders could hear directly from the 7 young people about their experience being moved.</li> </ul> <p><b>2. Labour Relations</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>➤ Most facilities that were closed were represented by a bargaining agent.</li> <li>➤ Based on experience advance notice of facility closures does not work.</li> <li>➤ Advance notice of facility closures takes away from the focus on the young people.</li> <li>➤ More facility employees call in sick when they are given news weeks prior that their employment will be terminated.</li> <li>➤ Less disruption in the programming of young people in the facilities.</li> </ul> <p><b>3. Program Continuity</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>➤ None of the young people in the north were transferred to a facility in the south</li> <li>➤ Connected to Community strategy in place that used iPads to facilitate visits</li> </ul>

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>➤ Mental health supports remain in the system and are currently being reviewed to help broaden and enhancing those supports with regards to external connections and internal capacity.</li> <li>➤ Based on reduced numbers at facilities there is now more capacity support their young people’s mental health needs.</li> </ul> <p>Co-Chair Sara asked ADM Mitchell the following question:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• <i>“What plans are in place for the infrastructure of facilities that are closing and if there are any plans to consult with local service providers about the utilization of these facilities?”</i></li> </ul> <p>ADM Mitchell provided the following responses:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>➤ Facility utilization planning would depend on who owns the physical structure e.g government owned or transfer payment of recipient.</li> <li>➤ Three facilities in the north have repurpose provisions</li> <li>➤ Toronto East has repurposed facilities for human trafficking safe houses</li> <li>➤ Facilities that are not owned government have the discretion to choose what they would like to do with them post closure.</li> <li>➤ There is only one youth justice centre facility property that is owned by the government.</li> </ul> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Dianna (MOH) indicated that since secure treatment actually falls under the MOH, they would be happy to address any questions around this piece noted in the P-HSJCC submission with members.</li> </ul>
<p><b>7) Presentation from Mental Health Commission of Canada re: Mental Health and Justice Priorities</b></p>	<p>The Secretariat introduced Amy Fogarty, Manager of Programs &amp; Priorities and Katie Ellis, Program Manager at the Mental Health Commission of Canada who presented their key deliverables on mental health and justice priorities and discussed areas for potential collaboration between MHCC and the HSJCC Network.</p> <p><b>Three key priorities for MHCC for the areas of mental health and justice:</b></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. Identify major gaps and barriers accessing mental health care within the criminal justice system.</li> <li>2. Identify priority area and opportunities to move forward.</li> <li>3. Understand the field of mental health and justice and align resources with others involved in this work.</li> </ol> <p><b>Project milestones and deliverables:</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>➤ Stakeholder mapping to get a better understanding of who is doing what, in the area of mental health and justice.</li> </ul>

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>➤ Establishment of an Executive Advisory Committee to help guide the project throughout the duration of the contribution of the agreement.</li> <li>➤ Explored what the major challenges and opportunities are in mental health and justice system by commissioning a scoping review and survey.</li> <li>➤ Published a national evidence report which served as base for discussion at a national forum in March 2019 which brought together stakeholders across Canada to identify priority areas of action in mental health and justice.</li> </ul> <p>The MHCC discussed the following resources:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>➤ The Mental Health Needs of Justice-Involved Persons –Infographic <a href="https://www.mentalhealthcommission.ca/English/media/4474">https://www.mentalhealthcommission.ca/English/media/4474</a></li> <li>➤ The Mental Health Needs of Justice-Involved Persons - A Rapid Scoping Review of the Literature: <a href="https://www.mentalhealthcommission.ca/English/media/4415">https://www.mentalhealthcommission.ca/English/media/4415</a></li> <li>➤ The National Inventory of Mental Health and Substance Abuse Services Report (set to be released summer 2021).</li> <li>➤ COVID-19 and Corrections Policy Brief (set to be released summer 2021).</li> </ul> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• The MHCC discussed a scoping exercise project that focused on the state of mental health crisis interventions involving and not involving police in Canada.</li> <li>• This exercise included key informant interviews, rapid review of literature of police and non police models conducted by CAMH and the University of Toronto, media scan (set to be finished in the summer of 2021).</li> </ul> <p><b>MHCC discussed four key activities as part of their work plan:</b></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. Development of a National Action Plan</li> <li>2. Support community-based peer support programs</li> <li>3. Enhancing community supports with an emphasis on transition services</li> <li>4. Knowledge Exchange and promote the mental health needs of people who are involved with the criminal justice system</li> </ol>

<p><b>8) Discussion re: Key messages for SolGen Regulatory Changes</b></p>	<p>The Secretariat led discussions on confirming key messages for the Ministry of Solicitor General proposed regulatory changes:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li><b>Discussion re: SolGen's Proposed Regulatory Amendments – Changes to the Correctional Services Act</b> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>The Ministry of the Solicitor General was looking for public feedback on the proposed regulatory changes to the Correctional Services Act related to: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>➤ Segregation</li> <li>➤ Discipline and misconduct of persons in custody</li> <li>➤ Mandatory Training</li> </ul> </li> </ul> </li> </ol> <p>The Secretariat proposed the following key messages to be included in a submission:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Recommending that none of the P-HSJCC identified populations with unique needs that are in corrections be placed in segregation and that the diagnosis is not necessary or recommended.</li> <li>Amy commented that the Ministry of Health has history identified serious mental illness as falling under the three D's (Diagnosis, Duration and Disability) meaning if one of those three D's are captured, it may qualify without the requirement for all three. The community mental health sector does not require diagnosis for eligibility of services and programming.</li> </ul> <p>The Secretariat brought attention to the race base data that is collected by the ministry:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>➤ Individuals that were in segregation from 2019 to 2020: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>○ 14 percent identified as Black</li> <li>○ 11 percent identified as Indigenous</li> <li>○ 7.8 percent identified as another racial identity</li> </ul> </li> <li>➤ Members indicated independent reviews should be conducted (independent meaning those not employed by the Ministry of the Solicitor General)</li> </ul>
