- Training in partnership with the OPP Community Safety Services Branch was provided to both of these communities during the month of March.
- The mobilization of Situation Tables in the Northwest region has diversified our membership and led to the addition of six regional partners. These community partners represent the health, education, justice, and Indigenous sector and are located in the District of Thunder Bay and the District of Kenora. Our regional committee membership currently includes upwards of 70 Senior Leaders. To provide an equitable meeting experience for all our regional partners, we are exploring virtual meeting options such as Adobe Connect and WebEx.

   assessments when a youth is unable to attend an assessment in-person. This technology has posed several challenges due to a lack of client participation and a poor quality high speed connection resulting in excessive time delays and grainy picture.
- It has been identified by youth community partners in Kenora that OTN is not an ideal option and without any adjudication, there remains no funding available for youth to attend these court-ordered assessments in-person. MCYS has been consulted and they have indicated that once 30 days passes, the youth is no longer under the Youth Justice supervision and therefore no mechanism to fund for transport.
- This issue continues to affect youth living in remote communities who are in conflict with the law. Our
