Welcome and Introductions

Everyone introduced themselves.

Review of January 11, 2022 minutes

The minutes of the January 11, 2022 meeting were approved.

Review Action Items:

Were reviewed and completed

Presentation: Dr. Catherine Wiseman-Hakes and Dr. Flora Matheson on Traumatic Brain Injury (TBI) and the Criminal Justice System.

Presentation slides will be circulated.

Objectives:

- -Introduction to TBI, understanding the prevalence of TBI in the correctional population
- -TBI as a risk factor for incarceration, understanding the cognitive-communication and social communication impairments associated with TBI
- -strategies you may use to support clients
- -available resources.

Definition of TBI- an alteration in brain function or other evidence of brain pathology caused by an external force

Different processes were discussed; mild TBI and moderate-severe TBI.

TBI meets the World Health Organization criteria for chronic disease. Should be viewed as a chronic disease and defined as such by policy makers, health care and insurance providers.

TBI is associated with cognitive, communication, emotional and behavioural challenges that complicate management during incarceration and create barriers to successful community reintegration.

Following TBI, many individuals have problems processing emotions.

Strategies for working with clients: supporting cognitive-communication challenges were discussed.

Referral Network: John Howard Society of Toronto, Brain Injury Society of Toronto (BIST), OBIA, Toronto abi Network as well various links were also provided. See below:

Supporting people with experiences of incarceration and traumatic brain injury: Training for front-line service providers – MAP Centre for Urban Health Solutions (maphealth.ca)

Themes discussed: Misconception that people are cured from a TBI. Its a chronic disease. Flora spoke about the current research; 80% of people with TBI are dealing with addictions and 60% have mental health struggles. To look at conditions of release and understanding TBI. The role of education is important for providing solutions to TBI. What is the quick way to get diagnosed? The Inner City Health Team has offered to assist with diagnosis. ABI network has a navigator who can provide support. It was noted that it is beneficial to assume that all clients have TBI given the high percentage that do in the context of the justice system. The main issues is that there is a long wait list for many services.

Catherine and Flora were thanked for the informative and insightful presentation. Members expressed interest to have a Lunch and Learn on this topic.

Lunch and Learns

Domenica reported on the upcoming Lunch and Learns.

- There will be a Lunch and Learn on the CAMH Gender Identity Clinic on March 8th.
- The New Toronto Courthouse and Toronto Region Bail Centre session held on February 10th was successful. Two hundred and sixty-eight people registered and 158 were in attendance.
- The SolGen's Reintegration Unit session was held on February 24th. One hundred and fifty-three registered and seventy-two were in attendance.
- The NY-HSJCC Lunch and Learn on the CAMH Sexual Behaviour Clinic took place on January 20th. PowerPoint slides were circulated.

Approval/Review Workplan for 2022-2023

Workplan 2022-2023 was circulated prior to the meeting. It was noted that the 2201 Finch Avenue West Courthouse will become the Toronto Region Bail Centre as well. Its beneficial to enhance the committee's relationship with the TSDC to ensure coordination issues are seamless.

Proposed budget: \$600 TTC tokens, \$650 food vouchers, \$2500 Lunch and Learns/Anti-Racism Series, Honorarium \$240, Virtual Court Equipment \$1750. The Toronto Regional HSJCC is meeting on March $10^{\rm th}$ and the workplan and budget will be approved then and submitted to the Provincial HSJCC.

Updates from T-HSJCC and Provincial HSJCC:

Patricia reported that the Toronto Regional committee has established an Anti-Racism Ad Hoc committee. Its membership includes all local HSJCC Co-chairs. The main goal is to develop an Anti-Racism educational session for the HSJCC target population. This is reflected in the Local HSJCC workplan.

Next T-HSJCC meeting is taking place on March 10th

Domenica reported on the Provincial HSJCC. They will be meeting next week. Planning for the next conference began. There is support to continue with a virtual conference because many people were able to attend from up north. Six hundred and eighty people attended the conference. A hybrid model is too expensive.
